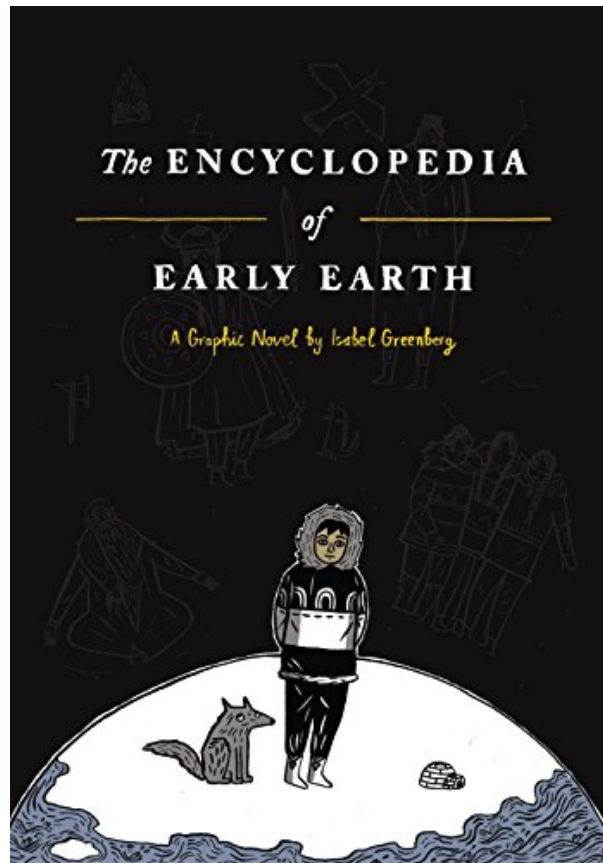
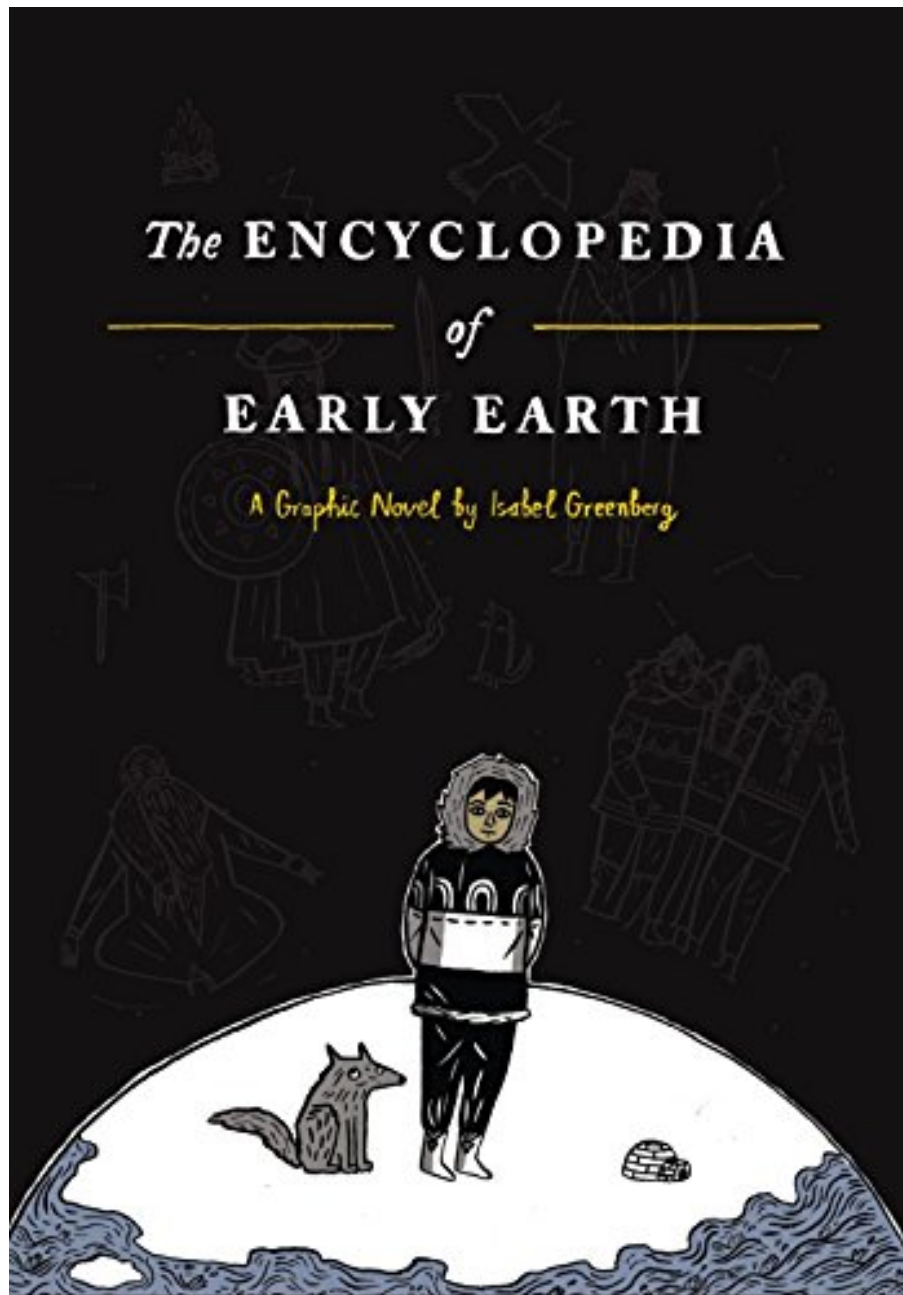

Books like this is the main reason why I don't read everything on Kindle: the large format is magical! It will probably take no more than 2 hours to read every story of the book, but you could look at pictures for days and ponder the archetypes used in the book for years. The quality of writing is excellent: ancient myths (also

biblical) are reimagined in new circumstances and retold in a contemporary film language, There are also some myths that probably are invented by the author but have that ancient feel. In a way this is similar to Michael Ende's "Neverending Story" which is the highest compliment I could give to a book (warning: the Encyclopediadia is wonderful but not THAT exceptional). Writing is non-linear, in places - encyclopedic, but somehow, having read the whole book, there is an impression of an almost coherent whole.
